Location: 134 Iron Street, Minersville, Johnstown, Cambria County, Pa.

<u>Description</u>: No. 134 Iron Street is a large multi-family and retail building, facing southeast on a corner lot with a multi-family building to one side. The structure is rectangular, built of brick with a side gable roof. It is three stories tall and ten bays long. The roof displays three gable dormers. Two vacant storefronts, approximately 20' wide, are on the first floor. Vacant residential units are on the second and third floors.

History: No. 134 Iron Street was constructed between 1903 and 1906. Michael Harrigan and William Sturver purchased several lots here in 1903 for \$3,300. The relatively high price for the land may have been a factor of its proximity to the lower works of the Cambria Iron Company. Benjamin Applebaum purchased the building from both parties between 1906 and 1908 for \$5,400. The 1910 census records Applebaum, a merchant, his family of four, a servant and approximately forty boarders as residents. Applebaum was born in "Austria-Poland," according to the census, and sold groceries and dry goods. The boarders were mostly males, between the ages of 20 and 30, and primarily Polish. Nearly all of the boarders were laborers in the steel mills. Michael Billow purchased the property in 1919 and the Billow family has retained ownership since then.

According to present and former Minersville residents, the building housed a small branch of the Penn Traffic Department Store in this era. The store closed, they say, during the Depression. According to a 1931 city directory, Michael Billow operated a grocery store here.
