JAMES CONNELLY HOUSE

Location: 159 Iron Street, Minersville, Johnstown, Cambria County, Pa.

<u>Description</u>: Free-standing single-family house. Two-and-a-half stories, stone basement, asbestos over wood frame. Fine mansard roof with windows that have attractive decorative wood cornices. The house is 20' x 30'. Shed-roofed front porch.

History: In November 1882 James Connelly bought this property from Patrick Minahan for \$515. In 1884 Susan, who was James's widow, gave the property to her children, John, Ellen and Catherine. The house is noted on the tax assessment card as dating from 1884. It is shown in the 1895 Sanborn as a two-story structure; the third story was added between 1895 and 1911. In the city directory for 1895 John Connelly, who was a laborer, is listed as living in and owning the house. By 1900 the Connellys were renting out the house. In the census for that year D. Dynon, of Irish descent, a watchman with the railroad, his wife and daughter were tenants. In 1910 James Harron from Pennsylvania, his wife and two children were tenants.

The house passed to various members of the Connelly family until it was sold in 1936 to Catherine Sandak Marchok. In 1986 the property, then including 161 Iron St. and 158 Connelly Ave., as well as this house, was sold to Daniel and Mary Zahurak by Edward C. Marchok for \$13,000.
