Location: 171-73 Iron Street, Minersville, Johnstown, Cambria County, Pa.

Description: Two-and-a-half stories, wood-frame building accommodating a saloon and a dwelling. Irregular plan, 36' x 45'. Stone basement. The principal front has asphalt and vinyl covering. The entrance to the dwelling had an attractive carved wooden porch which was replaced after 1981 by plain timber posts. The saloon has a brick front framed by wooden pilasters and fascia. One of the pilasters is carved and has an attractive carved console bracket. Second-floor five-bay facade has architraved windows. Gambrel roof with three dormers.

History: In June 1891 Thomas and James Minahan sold this property to James P. Burns. In 1891 James P. Burns is noted in the city directory as a saloon keeper at 215 Iron St. It is possible no. 173 had a different number at this period. This building was definitely built by 1895, as it is shown on the 1895 Sanborn map as a two-story structure known as the Arlington Hotel. By 1911 the third story had been added.

In the 1900 census James P. Burns is noted as 42 years old, from Pennsylvania of Irish parents, occupation saloon keeper. He had a wife and six children.

In November 1925 Burns delivered a deed for the premises to Jacob Adamy, but this had been lost and never recorded. Jacob Adamy died and it was not until 1941 that the property was officially registered in Adamy's name.
