Save Energy with Trees

Carefully placed trees can provide cooling summer shade, protect your home from chilling winter winds, and maximize energy gains from winter sunlight-cutting annual home energy use by as much as 15 to 35 percent.

Slow the Wind...For an average frame house air filtration from wind can cause about 1/3 of the winter heat loss. Heat loss can be significantly reduced by planting a windbreak in the direction from which prevailling winds blow.

Plant evergreen trees close together to create a complete wall against the wind. Choose trees adapted to your region with branches close to the ground.



Where will it land? ... If you live where blowing snow is a problem, drifts will develop on the downwind side of a windbreak.

Be sure to allow sufficient distance between your windbreak and driveways and walkways.




Work with the Sun?...Deciduous (broadleaf) trees are nature's energy savers. They shade and cool homes in summer. When leaves fall in the winter, warming sunlight streams through. Best results generally come from trees planted to the east and west of the house, rather than the south. Because the sun is directly overhead at midday in summer, trees on the south will not shade the house unless they are planted very close to it.

Trees planted on the east, west and northwest sides provide the best shade during morning and afternoon in summer, while minimizing unwanted winter shades.



For quickest shade,... plant fast growing trees close to the house, as well as slower growing longer lived trees a short distance away. The fast growing trees can be removed after the more durable species have matured.

Trees planted on the south will produce unwanted shade in the winter, when the sun is at a low angle.



Trees/Energy Savings

Planting a tree today may well mean dollars in your pocket tomorrow. A few well placed trees will provide shade that can reduce summer air conditioning costs up to 15 to 35 percent. In fact, according to the Environmental Protection Agency, if enough shade trees were planted in suburban areas and commercial districts, the "heat Island" effect of cities could be significantly reduced. Heat islands are zones of the landscape that are dominated by buildings and pavement that commonly have air temperatures many degrees higher than areas, such as parks, rural or well-shaded neighborhoods. Heat islands are expanding with the spread of cities and shopping malls. As a result, the temperature difference accounts for an estimated 3 to 8 percent of all urban electric use, costing over \$1 billion yearly. Planting trees to reduce the "heat island" effect not only reduces the cooling costs, it also reduces pollution. Residents should plant trees and shrubs to shade their air conditioning compressor units. It can increase efficiency as much as 10%. If you use an evaporative cooler, this advice doesn't apply. They need sun to operate efficiently.

Who's Right?"

Many residents question trees on the property between the sidewalk and curbs. The trees lining Southmont Borough are within the street "right-of-way" and are therefore the property of all borough residents and property owners. Owners' of the property that abut the street tree locations maintain these trees. During storms when tree limbs have blown down or have fallen in the streets, borough employees pick up the limbs and branches from the trees lining the streets. In some cases, whole trees have fallen onto the streets or other properties. It is important to open the street up and remove the fallen tree for emergency purposes. These fallen trees become the responsibility of the property owner from which the tree has fallen, and it is their obligation to remove the tree. Periodically, the Shade Tree Commissioner or the Mayor review the trees lining the streets for any dangerous trees that overhang the roadways. Notices are sent to the property owner to have these hazardous conditions removed.

With this proclamation, a Public Service program sponsored by the UPMC-Lee SPARC team will provide stroke screening tests to residents at the Borough building on June 18, 1998, between the hours of 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. The SPARC team will do the stroke screening tests, at no cost to you. Everyone is invited. The test will consist of a patient history, blood pressure and pulse test, cholesterol screening and a one on one review of the tests. A follow-up letter will be sent to each participant after the laboratory results are done.

The Southmont Volunteer Fire Co. announces it's upcoming expansion. Hopefully, ground will be broken in the summer on the new equipment bays. The new bays will be attached to the current station, with the driveway facing Thoburn Street. The current station provides little room between trucks. RECYCLING NEWS

WHY DOESN'T EVERYONE RECYCLE??? Last years recylced material volume was 57,552 pounds or 28.77 tons. This gave the Borough a credit of approximately \$900.00 from the garbage contract. You recycled 10,512 #'s of mixed paper, 15,440 #'s of colored glass. The three year contract and the voluntary recycling program has enabled you, the residents, to receive the reduced garbage collection fee for the year 1998. The annual Spring Cleanup will be April 29 and April 30, 1998 in conjunction with your regular pick-up. It will be advertised. The first newspaper collection date was scheduled for March 28, 1998 at 8:00 a.m. until Noon. The other newspaper dates are June 7th, August 8th and October 17th. Please watch for the newspaper and Spring clean-up schedules.

The recycling center is open from 7:00 a.m. to dusk Monday thru Saturday. Thursdays we are closed from 7 a.m until 11:00 a.m., to taketherecyclable materials to the Total Recycling center in Boswell. Reminder everyone, do not include plastic bags in the individual bins. Use the outside bins provided. All glass must be separated. Rinse cans and plastics. Compress plastics. NO light bulbs, mirrors, drinking glass, cups, dishes and window or safety glass or wire hangers. Ordinance 389 provides for fines of up to \$300.00 for littering or placing unspecified items into the recycling bins. These items cause the entire load to be contaminated resulting in unnecessary additional costs. Thanks for your participation and cooperation.

renovating the Soccer/Ballfield. A new storage shed is being built with the help of Greater Johnstown High School students Building Trades & Maintenance Class.


CLIP & SAVE


Protect Your Trees

There are a number of animals which will browse on vegetation. Deer, rabbits, mice and etc.... The most likley are the deer and rabbits. Deer have no front incisor teeth on their upper jaw. The deercut will have a frayed edge on one side. A double row of incisors on the upper front jaws of a rabbit will produce a cleanly severed twig cut. Enclose your young trees or shrub for protection.



Mulch Your Trees

The single best thing you can do for trees is to try to duplicate the mulch which nature provides in the forest. Apply about 4" (no more) of composted wood chips, leaves or other organic matter around the base of the tree. Circle the tree at least three feet in diameter. Keep mulch away from the bark. Mulch conserves moisture, cools the soil, and prevents erosion.



Inspect Your Property

As the spring and summer months progress, tree leaves, branches and limbs begin to obscure driveways, sidewalks and hinder the visibility of traffic. Inspect your property and clean up any overgrown shrub and or trees that might be causing problems for the many neighbors who like to walk and drive thru our area. Remember, it is the property owners responsibility to keep their area free of any hazardous limbs or shrub overhanging into the street or sidewalks. Also, remember to have your house numbers visible from the street.

Permits Required

BEFORE you prune, trim, or remove any tree in the Borough Right of Way, you MUST obtain a permit. The permit if FREE, but necessary to insure proper attention is given to "our" shared treasure.

<u>Don't Top Tree</u> This story has been told before, however, topping causes all kinds of problems from the creation of weak sucker wood to potentially fatal introduction of rot and disease.

HOME GROWN: RAMPS

Wild leeks sprout from the rich soil of the forest floor in early April, before the leaves open on the trees. "Ramps" as they are called by the "mountain folks" are the first green thing to grow in the woods. The plant roots belongs to the lily family and are closely related to garlic. Ramps, the sweetest of the wild onions, are a delicacy to local folks. The shiny leaves grow in pairs, appearing in colonies on dark moist woods floors. The leaves spice up a salad and the white bulbs makes a great onion soup. Folk tales report the Cherokees ate the leaves for colds, croup and as a spring tonic. Ramps are also a folk remedy against cancer, much like the garlic remedy. Some even cut and rub the bulb on insect bites.

A Sweet Discovery

Early spring, sap buckets appear on sugar maple trees through out Pennsylvania. The sap, which contains water, is cooked until most of water is evaporated, leaving a sticky, tasty, and wonderful maple syrup. There is an Iroquios legend about the discovery of maple sugar. According to legend, Chief Woksis came home from hunting and hurled his tomahawk into a maple tree next to his lodge. When he pulled the tomahawk from the tree it left a long gash. His wife had left a clay pot beneath the tree and in the spring it filled with the liquid watery sap. She used the liquid to cook venison that night and found the meat to be sweeter and very flavorful. Hence, the flavorful maple syrup.
