In April, the team competed in the State Capitol Building in Harrisburg by virtue of their championship in the Johnstown Area League.

The High School Forensics Team won the District and Regional Forensics Titles. The **Grade 4 Current Events Team** earned the third highest total cumulative score of a total of thirty-three elementary schools across the United States who participated in this national competition. The team's

Sports

Athletic teams won the Laurel Highlands Athletic Conference Championship trophy for all sports for the sixth consecutive year and achieved LHAC Championships in the following sports (* indicates District 6 AA Championship as well): Girls' Soccer* (top four finish in state competition), Girls' Volleyball*, Golf, Girls' Tennis (second in District 6), Boys' Soccer, Varsity Girls' Basketball*, and Junior High Football.

The Eighth Grade football team completed an undefeated season.

Three of our Cross Country runners qualified for the PIAA State Meet: Travis Dean, Allison Eanes, and Giles Eanes. Travis placed 6th in the competition.

The Girls' Basketball Team, in addition to winning the LHAC and District 6 titles, won the championship at the Chevy Shootout Tournament, and made it all the way to the State AA Championship Game for the second year in a row.

The Boys' Basketball Team won the annual Hilltopper Classic and the Windber Rotary Tournament.

The Boys' Track Team finished second in the state this year.

The Varsity Wrestling Team won the championship of the Boneyard Bash Tournament.

Zach Bennett and Kyle Patton advanced to the PIAA State Championships. Zach was the runnerup and Kyle finished in 7th place.

Five Westmont Hilltop wrestlers were named to the State's All-Academic Wrestling Team: Michael Brant and T.J. Polacek – 1st Team; Quinten Cameron, Devin Dorian, and Kyle Patton – Honorable Mention.

Four of our younger wrestlers -Trevor Kushner, Tanner Hough, Joshua Polacek, and Logan Blackburn – finished as Area 2 Regional Champions in Pennsylvania Junior Wrestling Competition.

Kali Antolik was named to the Pennsylvania Volleyball Coaches Association's All-State Volleyball Team.

Kelly Britcher and Kate Lintner both eclipsed the 1000 career point mark in basketball.

Karlee McQuillen set a new PA State Record in the javelin at the West Central Coaches Meet in Altoona with a throw of 161' 5", topping the old record by nearly two feet.

The Boys' Swim Team won the Central Western Conference Championship and finished with an undefeated record. Five swimmers advanced to the PIAA State Swim Meet at Bucknell. The swimmers, along with their event and final finish in the competition (if achieved) follows: Kelly Dorian (1st – 100 Fly; 2nd – 200 Freestyle), Kevin Koul, Kieran Layton (3rd – 500 Freestyle; 3rd – 50 Freestyle), John Livingston (3rd – 200 IM; 3rd – 100 Fly), David Mancinelli (2nd – 100 Fly; 3rd – 200 Freestyle), and Lucas Staib (2nd – 200 Medley).

Kara Kohler achieved 3rd Place in the 100 Breast Stroke at the PIAA State Swim Meet.

Hall of Fame 2006 Induction Ceremonies

On July 22, 2006, Sue Minchau, our veteran Westmont Hilltop Boys' and Girls' Tennis Coach was inducted into the Cambria County Hall of Fame. Miss Chuba's Farewell Awards Assembly

"Welcome everyone, especially our guests, to our annual Awards Assembly. Today we gather to celebrate the achievements of the class of 2006. I have had the pleasure of working with this group of students since they entered WHHS in Grade 9.

This September, as we welcome the class of 2010 to their freshman year at Westmont, members of the class of 2006 will be beginning new educational experiences in various locations. Out of state 2006 grads will be in Indiana at the University of Notre Dame, in Arizona at Arizona State University, in New Mexico at New Mexico State University, in Florida at Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University and the American Motorcycle Institute, in Virginia at the College of William and Mary, in North Carolina at Duke University, Elon University, and the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, in South

at Clemson University, in West Virginia at West Virginia University and Bethany College, in Vermont at Castleton State College, in Rhode Island at Salve Regina University, in Connecticut at the University of Connecticut, in New York at New York University in Manhattan, in New Jersey at Burlington County College, in Washington, D.C. at George Washington University and American University, in Maryland at Frostburg State University, in Delaware at the University of Delaware, and in Ohio at Case Western Reserve University, Ohio University Honors College, Kent State University, the University of Findlay, and Marietta College.

Many of our 2006 graduates, however, will be staying in Pennsylvania. In Eastern PA, they will be attending Lehigh University, West Chester University, Temple University, and Bloomsburg University. In Central PA, they will be attending Lycoming College, Juniata College, Shippensburg University, Lock Haven University, and Pennsylvania College of Technology in Williamsport. Penn State's University Park campus and Altoona campus will welcome a total of 18 members of the class of 2006. In Northwest PA, in the Erie area, they will attend

Gannon University, Mercyhurst College, and Edinboro University.

Academic "Best" Awards are presented to students in Grade 8 who represent the academic best in particular subject areas. Selection is quite a challenge, since so many students in our school represent their own high standards of academic best. A \$100 savings bond is awarded to the students in each category. The following criteria apply:

English: The student in this category must demonstrate scholarship, leadership, a positive attitude, class participation, responsibility, accountability, dependability, and initiative. That student is **Sara Rogerson**.

Mathematics: The student must participate in the PACE Program, and consideration is given to both aptitude and achievement. Classroom performance is evaluated, and outcomes of current challenges and competitions are also considered. The

mathematics award recipient is **Juliana Bukoski**.

Science: To qualify for the science award, the student must have an "A" average for three quarters, participate in all aspects of class (lectures, labs, question/answer, discussions), demonstrate leadership, respect for others, responsibility, reliability, and a mature attitude.

Matthew Rizzo has earned this award.

Civics: The student must demonstrate scholastic high achievement, citizenship as demonstrated through school and community service, and must show initiative through class participation. Megan Mulrooney is the recipient of the civics award.

Art: The selected student must display good citizenship and class participation, have a positive effect on peers, exhibit a high level of creativity, and demonstrate a significant level of improvement or achievement. The Best Award goes to the student who shows consistent production of high quality work from Grade 5 through Grade 8. Hannah Winterscheidt was chosen as the recipient of this award.

Foreign Language: The academic best in this category must achieve 95% in each of three quarters, demonstrate excellent class participation and a positive classroom attitude, and

demonstrate classroom leadership and reliability. **Christine Weidner** (French) and **Michael Young** (Spanish) have earned the foreign language award.

Music: Participation in at least one ensemble is required for this award, along with superior grades in general music class; the student must possess leadership, responsibility, a positive attitude, and dependability. Anne Rummel is the recipient of the music award.

Physical Education: The student selected in this category must display a positive attitude toward physical education, participate to the best of his or her ability in all activities at all times, score, at the least, the average requirement on the National Physical Fitness Test for Fitness, maintain a sense of game, and demonstrate responsible, respectful behavior as a team player. World Language Students Achieve

Mrs. Diane Rugh recognized the accomplishments of Westmont Hilltop World Language students at the academic assembly on June 1, 2006. The Appalachian Language Educators' Society, or APPLES, Foreign Language Festival is hosted at Indiana University of Pennsylvania. This year, the event involved over 300 students from more than a dozen area school districts. Despite many conflicting responsibilities on the festival day, thirty students participated, proving

that interest in world language remains high in our district.

Two students maximized their opportunity to study both French and Spanish in high school. Both Caitlin Motley and Sarah Sahlaney have completed five levels of both French and Spanish with an exemplary record. These two students were recommended to the Pennsylvania State Modern Language Association for inclusion in its High School World Language Recognition Program.

Senatorial "Good Citizenship Award"

Senator Wozniak provides special recognition to a student who meets the following criteria: 1) superior academic achievement, 2) leadership capacity, 3) consistent work habits, 4) a positive self-image, and 5) the ability to interact positively with others. Students are nominated to receive this honor.

Christine Carroll Weidner is the recipient of the Senatorial Good Citizenship Award.

American Legion Awards

This award is presented by the American Legion Auxiliary to one 8th grade boy and one 8th grade girl. The criteria used to select the recipients are listed as follows:

National Current Events League Award

The Current Events program encourages learning through media and discussion of what students are learning. Students in National Current Events League commit to seven months of extensive study of what's



Perfect Attendance




Signatures in Space

This year, our elementary students participated in the Student Signatures in Space® (S3) project. S3 is a centerpiece to the Space Day program, an annual event that takes place on the first Thursday of May. The ultimate goal of Space Day is to promote math, science, technology, and engineering education.

S3 gives elementary and middle school students the opportunity to send their personal signatures into space. Participating schools are sent giant posters for their students to sign on Space Day, along with supporting educational materials and program memorabilia. Participants return the posters to Lockheed Martin, and the signatures are digitally captured from the posters. NASA then includes the signatures in the manifest of a U.S. space shuttle mission. After the mission, the posters are returned to the schools for display, along with an



official NASA certification verifying that the signatures flew in space, as well as a photo of the crew that took the signatures up.



Science and Language Arts Olympiads

Students in grades 2, 3, and 4 once again participated in the Science and Language Arts Olympiads. Both of these contests are based on multiple-choice questions, which are administered to grade level groups. Each contest has a time limit

of 35 minutes. There is no limit to the number of students who may participate. Nearly 200 students participated in the Language Arts Olympiad and 170 in the Science Olympiad this year! The sum of the top ten scores for each competition

is the school's team score. Questions for the Language Arts Olympiad are based on the following topics: spelling, vocabulary, reading comprehension, analogies, and grammar. Science Olympiad questions are based on factual knowledge as well as students' understanding of scientific processes.



Outstanding Male Athlete Bradley Kanuch

Bradley Kanuch was awarded the Outstanding Male Athlete Award for the 2005-2006 school year at the Athletic Awards Assembly. 




