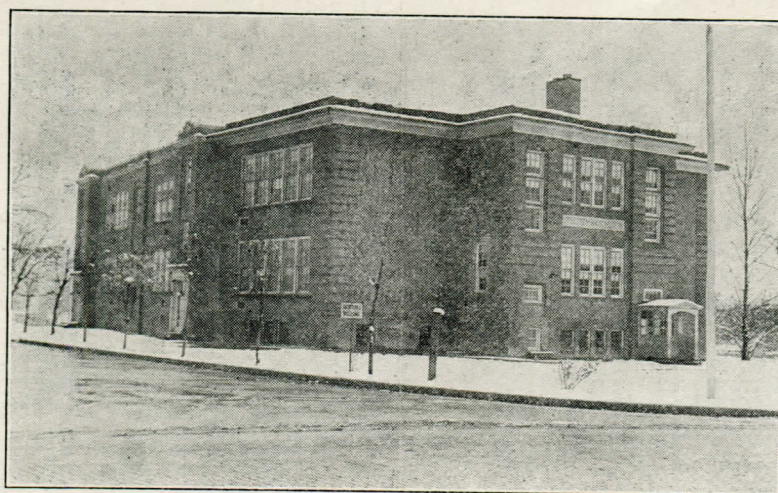

A HEALTH TALK

Dr. H. C. Blough gave a very informing health talk on "Circulation" to the seventh and eighth grades. He compared it to a railroad or transportation system. Dr. Blough said, "The circulation is a complicated system. It is made up of veins and arteries, heart and lungs, and the blood. The blood, which is the main part, is made up of three parts. The first is the plasma, a white fluid, the liquid part of the blood. It carries food to the different parts of the body or stores it under the skin as fat. Next are the red blood cells which carry oxygen and last are the white blood cells which carry the waste matter and which also fight disease germs. When a disease germ gets into the system thousands of these white cells attack it and kill it, but if they do not kill it, it grows and we get the disease." He also told us that there are five million red blood cells to every one-eighth inch cell. He then took us to the office and with a large microscope showed us some red blood cells and white blood cells which were magnified one million times. The red blood cells were reddish brown and had a hole in the middle. The white blood cells were pale green on the outside and on the inside they were a queer, dark shade.
