
WESTMONT OPENS CAGE SEASON

Westmont successfully. opened its 1945 cage slate on December 14 with an impressive 43-28 victory over Somerset. Our pintsized forward Herb Weiss rippled the cords for 18 points to lead all scorers. The most difficult game of the campaign yet was that against Alumni. Returning to their pre-war standards, the team consisted of: Ray Lantos and Dick Weiss, forwards; John McLeary and "Fish" Miller, guards; and Craig Kunkle at center, the team averaged over six feet. To ofset this, the Hilltoppers displayed a well balanced attack and after showing their heels for three quarters, they eased up to win a tight 17-16 victory.Forward Hipp paced his mates with 7. Conemaugh Township riding on the crest of a 5 game winning streak, fell before the Enghmen as they throttled the Indians shot

ace, "Peanuts" Kalminir.
Our next non--league tussle pitted up against a rangy fast-moving quintet from Allegany High School in Cumberland, Md. . After a pleasant afternoon spent at Cumberland's Y.M.C.A. the team went to Allegany's gym, where they also enjoyed themselves at Allegany's expense. The battle was as close as the paper on the wall for three quarters in which both teams played a careful steady ball game. Then both teams opened up with an all offensive with Westmont ending up on the long end of a 34-24 count. Again it was Johnny Hipp who paced the attack, with a total of 16. After a series of league engagements our boys travelled to Davidsville to engage the C.T. gagement. Again the Hiller quintet was too much for a stubborn township five.

West-mont, trailing 32-26, with only 22 minutes remaining, put in 12 straight points, 2 fouls and 5 field goals by Hipp, Weiss, and Coulson.

Westmont High's cagers scored an easy 48-17 triumph over Ebensburg High at Westmont, January 18. The losers were unable to make any field goals during the first half while Westmont made sixteen points. The biggest splurge of the evening was the third period, when the winners racked up 19 points. Weiss and Hipp were high scorers with 12 and 11 points respectively.

Friday, February 2, West mont won a 25-15 verdict over Ebensburg Cambria. Although trailing far behind the Red Devils froze the ball throughout the third quarter, making the third period scoreless.
