






HEAD COACHES

BLAIR COUNTY BOYS

Tim Keech

Tim Keech of Bellwood-Antis High School will serve as head coach of the Blair County boys' team in the second annual Altoona Mirror Basketball Classic.





He has a career record of 105-73, including 19-6 this year.

Keech led Bellwood-Antis to the 2003 District 6 Class AA championship.

Before ascending to the head coaching position, he previously was an assistant coach under Gene Yingling at B-A. He also spent time in the Hollidaysburg and Central High School programs.

Keech is a former manager on the Penn State football team (1982-85).

BLAIR COUNTY GIRLS

Don Appleman

Williamsburg High School's Don Appleman, a fixture on the local basketball scene for four decades, will serve as head coach of the Blair County girls' team in the second annual Altoona Mirror Basketball Classic.



As a player at Williamsburg, Appleman set the county scoring record with 2,100 points, which stood for 30 years.

He played collegiately at Penn State and St. Francis.


Appleman guided the Central and Williamsburg boys' programs for 17 years, posting a record of 286-149, including a pair of District 6 titles.

He has coached the Williamsburg Lady Pirates for six years, posting a record of 91-39. Appleman's overall career record is 377-188.

REGIONAL BOYS

Bruce Frycklund

Bruce Frycklund of Penn Cambria High School will serve as head coach of the Regional boys' team in the second annual Altoona Mirror Basketball Classic.





He coached Penn Cambria for 19 seasons, amassing a record of 329-168.

During his 27-year tenure, which included stints at Cambria Heights and Bishop Carroll, Frycklund rolled up a career record of 425-278, and he won a total of six District 6 championships — five at Penn Cambria and one at Cambria Heights.

He is a former member of the Penn State basketball team, having played for John Egli.

REGIONAL GIRLS

Jodi Hillegass

Jodi Hillegass of Westmont Hilltop High School will serve as head coach of the Regional girls' team in the second annual Altoona Mirror Basketball Classic.

Hillegass has built one of the top programs in the state at Westmont,



In seven seasons, she's rolled up an impressive won-loss record of 110-15.

During that time, Westmont has won three District 6 championships and has made two appearances in the PIAA Class AA championship game.

Westmont had two players on the Regional team last year and has two more this year in Kelly Britcher and Karlee McQuillen.

Hillegass played her high school basketball at Ferndale, where she was a 1,000-point scorer and she played college basketball at Elizabethtown. Interestingly, she scored 14 points for Cambria County in the 1993 Big John Riley Classic.

HONORARY COACHES



BLAIR COUNTY BOYS

Bernie Jubeck

Bernie Jubeck will serve as the honorary coach for the Blair County boys' team in the second annual Altoona Mirror Basketball Classic.

Jubeck brings a diverse background, having coached at the high school and collegiate level and spent time in both boys' and girls' basketball.



He is the former head coach at Hollidaysburg Area High School (1983-92), where he posted a record of 126-99 and won the District 6 Class AAAA championship in 1989.

He was a two-time Mirror coach of the year (1984, '85).

He also was a former head coach at Mount Aloysius and previously served as an assistant at St. Francis University along with Altoona Area High School, Bishop Guilfoyle and Bellwood-Antis.

Jubeck is a teacher at the Hollidaysburg Senior High School, and he continues to conduct a number of area basketball camps.

BLAIR COUNTY GIRLS

John Frederick

John Frederick will serve as the honorary coach for the Blair County girls' team in the second annual Altoona Mirror Basketball Classic.

Frederick led the Bishop Guilfoyle Lady Marauders to a pair of PIAA championships — winning the AA title in 1984 and 1991.



He spent a total of 10 years coaching at BG and amassed a record of 223-76, including eight District 6 championships and three trips to the state finals.

Frederick was the Mirror coach of the year in 1984 and '91.

The Mirror Classic will reunite Frederick with one of his early standouts, Chris (O'Connor) Lum, who is serving as honorary captain of the Blair County girls' team.

Frederick, executive director for the Professional Recyclers of Pennsylvania, currently resides in Bellwood and is active in BG's elementary basketball program, where he's coaching his son.

REGIONAL BOYS

Mike Fields

Mike Fields will serve as the honorary coach for the Regional boys' team in the second annual Altoona Mirror Basketball Classic.

Fields led the Juniata Valley Green Hornets to a pair of appearances in the PIAA Class A championship game, which Valley won in 1996.



Under Fields, the Hornets established a national reputation for 3-point shooting. Juniata Valley is noted 16 times in the 2005 national high school record book, including first place for 3-pointers made in a season (382) and most 3-pointers attempted in a game (94), both established in '97.

Fields, 245-109 in 13 seasons at Valley, was the Mirror's coach of the year in 1995 and '96 and the Associated Press small school coach of the year in '96.

He retired from Juniata Valley in 2003 and moved to California, but the game lured Fields back. He spent three seasons as a junior varsity coach at Chaparral High School in Temecula, Calif, and he's now the varsity coach at Mynderse Academy in Seneca Falls, N.Y.

REGIONAL GIRLS

Sue Conner

Sue Conner will serve as the honorary coach for the Regional girls' team in the second annual Altoona Mirror Basketball Classic.

Connor built the Everett program to unprecedented heights, presiding over it for 19 seasons and posting a career record of 328-146 before stepping down in 2005.



Included on her path of success were eight District 5 titles, including five straight from 1990-95.

Both of Conner's daughters, Jess and Samantha, played college basketball at IUP and UPJ, respectively.


Her appearance in the Mirror Classic reunites her with former Everett star Krista Jay, who went on to play at Division I George Mason and is tonight's honorary Regional captain.

Conner, who also coached softball, remains a teacher in the Everett school district.

BLAIR COUNTY BOYS

Nick Leasure

Nick Leasure will serve as the honorary captain for the Blair County boys' team in the second annual Altoona Mirror Basketball Classic.



He was an all-state performer for the Golden Eagles and played in the Dapper Dan Roundball Classic.

Leasure was inducted into the Tyrone Golden Eagle Monogram Club Hall of Fame in 2001.

Thirty years after he played there, he remains Tyrone's all-time leading scorer with 1,757 points.

Married with two children, Leasure is currently a physician, specializing in hematology and oncology. He resides in Pottstown.

BLAIR COUNTY GIRLS

Chris (O'Connor) Lum

Chris (O'Connor) Lum will serve as the honorary captain for the Blair County girls' team in the second annual Altoona Mirror Basketball Classic.

Lum was the player of the year on the Mirror's first all-star team in 1983-84 after leading Bishop Guilfoyle to the 1984 PIAA Class AA title.

BG's title was its first and the first of any Blair County girls' team.

Lum's high school coach, John Frederick, will serve as the honorary coach for the Blair County girls' team.

Almost a quarter decade later, Lum remains the Lady Marauders' all-time scoring leader with 1,395 points and BG's fourth-leading career rebounder (623).

Lum went from BG to East Carolina, where she played four seasons and graduated in 1989.

She is married with two children. She resides and coaches basketball in Advance, N.C.

REGIONAL BOYS

Joe Nastasi

Joe Nastasi will serve as the honorary captain for the Regional boys' team in the second annual Altoona Mirror Basketball Classic.

Nastasi, a former Northern Bedford High School standout, is the sixth all-time leading scorer in Pennsylvania high school history



with 2,961 points. He was a three-time first-team Mirror all-star and the 1994 player of the year.

Nastasi follows his younger brother, A.J., who was an honorary captain last year and is the state's all-time leading scorer with 3,883 points. Between them, the two Nastasi brothers scored a total of 6,844 points.

Joe Nastasi went on to become a starting receiver with the Penn State football team (1994-98).

He currently is involved with several business ventures in State College.

REGIONAL GIRLS

Krista Jay

Krista Jay will serve as the honorary captain for the Regional girls' team in the second annual Altoona Mirror Basketball Classic.

Jay is a former Everett standout who remains the Lady Warriors' all-time leading scorer with 1,792 points and was a first-team Mirror all-star in 1994.



She earned a scholarship to George Mason, where she was a four-year starter, and she is No. 7 on the school's all-time scoring list with 1,400 points.

Jay played one season of professional basketball in Sweden.

After her playing days, Jay went into coaching. She spent one season (2000-01) as an assistant at Longwood University in Virginia and then two seasons on the Duquesne University women's basketball staff (2001-03). Jay is currently an assistant basketball coach and head girls' track coach at Annandale High School in Virginia.





ig John Riley spent his career as a radio and television personality in the Altoona-Johnstown market.

Moreover, Big John devoted his life to giv-

ing of himself to others. He especially believed in empowering young people to reach their educational.

This mission statement was embraced by the entire Riley family, the results of which are manifested in the Altoona Mirror Basketball Classic in memory of Big John Riley, my father, and Tom Riley, my brother.

Big John was active in local community affairs for over 35 years until he fell ill and left his beloved Altoona way too soon. He was a major force behind keeping the Miss Pennsylvania Pageant in Altoona, and he served as co-producer and master of ceremonies.

His memberships included the Altoona Symphony, Blair County Heart Association, Altoona Optimist Club, Blair County unit of the American Cancer Society and countless other worthwhile organizations.

The common thread which ran through all of Big John's affiliations was his love for people and a genuine desire to make a difference through his celebrity. His devotion towards improving lives was memorialized when his alma mater, St Francis College, awarded him, posthumously, the honorary degree of Doctor of Humanities in 1983, for using, "his career in the service of others."

This was his legacy.

We all know behind every successful man is a great woman. Dee Riley was married to Big John for over 30 years. They were the quintessential public service couple, with Dee generously devoting her time to producing the Miss Pennsylvania Pageant, where she was recognized nationally for the state's leading edge production.

Dee spent her entire life bettering the lives of other women by supporting

their growth and stressing education, all while raising her three beautiful children. During Big John's illness, and after his death, Dee worked hand in hand with Tom to keep the Big John Riley Classic alive, believing in the betterment of young people so deeply. She, too, fell ill and left us in July of 2001.

John Riley Jr., the eldest child of Big John and Dee, took the Riley family values south to Miami. John, a graduate of Bishop Guilfoyle and later Penn State, used his locally harvested education and became residing Vice President of Human Resources for Royal Caribbean Cruise Lines.

Always the champion of evenhandedness and opportunity, John effectively hired and managed thousands of people from the diverse cultures of the

Caribbean, South America, Asia and Europe. In effect, he was providing them with the prospect of a burgeoning future that otherwise may have not been afforded to them.




1987 Blair County won the girls' game 57-36. The Blair boys won as well, 109-97, to make it four straight sweeps.


